Megan Bears Augustyn, PhD, is an Associate Professor in the Department of Criminology and Criminal Justice at the University of Texas at San Antonio and has a courtesy faculty appointment in the College of Criminology and Criminal Justice at Florida State University. Her research examines the causes and consequences of crime, victimization, and other health-risk behaviors across the life course. She also examines public perceptions of crime and deviance, particularly sexual violence. She is the current PI and Data Manager for the Rochester Youth Development Study, and she serves on the editorial boards of the Journal of Research in Crime and Delinquency and Justice Quarterly. Her research has been published in various outlets, including Criminology, the Journal of Research in Crime and Delinquency, Journal of Interpersonal Violence, and Development and Psychopathology.

Executive Counselor (Membership Chair)

Elias S. Nader is an Associate Professor in the Department of Sociology and Criminology at Kent State University. His areas of research include the transition to adulthood among justice-involved young people and the evaluation of police practices and initiatives. His developmental and life course research has been both qualitative and quantitative in nature, focused on examining the role of social bonds in desistance and the impact of maturation on the transition to adulthood. This work has recently been funded by the Russell Sage Foundation. He is also the author of *Growing Up and Out of Crime: Desistance, Maturation, and Emerging Adulthood* published by Routledge in 2024.



Executive Counselor (Awards Chair)

Kelsey Cundiff is an Assistant Professor in the Department of Criminology and Criminal Justice at the University of Missouri-St. Louis. She received her Ph.D. in criminology from Pennsylvania State University. Her research examines trends in crime and offending over the life-course of both people and places.
